Federal Agencies Begin New Plan for Columbia-Snake Salmon

Submit comments and join a flotilla in support of restoring salmon

Last spring a federal judge threw out the federal government's salmon plan (called a Biological Opinion) for Columbia-Snake salmon and ordered them to develop a new one that met the law and followed sound science. Judge Simon strongly urged the federal agencies to include removal of the four lower Snake River dams, noting that dam removal was likely the best option both economically and biologically for restoring wild salmon and steelhead.

This fall/winter, salmon advocates will have a chance to urge the federal agencies and our elected leaders to remove four low-value high-cost dams on the lower Snake River to restore wild salmon and steelhead. Despite efforts

from a diverse coalition of fishing, recreation and conservation interests, the federal agencies have punted time and time again. But the landscape has changed. This time we have a real shot at getting the dams out and the fish back.

Fish scientists have long advocated lower Snake dam removal as the cornerstone to restoring wild salmon to the rivers of Idaho, northwest Oregon and southeast Washington. Each dam adds to fish mortality, but the 4 dams located in eastern Washington are especially lethal. The water behind these dams reaches lethal temperatures every year as the sun beats down on a river winding through desert shrub steppe. Climate change is


making the problem worse. Last year 99% of Idaho's sockeye salmon perished in the system. These catastrophes will become even more frequent unless salmon are provided an easier journey home.

The science hasn't changed. But the politics, economics and public opinion have shifted dramatically in the past 10 years. Barging on the lower Snake (the main benefit of the dams) has declined nearly 70 percent as shippers choose other options, while the costs of repairing the aging dams mount. Meanwhile, NW residents and politicians have seen first-hand the incredible ecological and economic benefits dam removal brings communities. Elwha, White

Salmon and other river restorations have changed the conversation.

There has never been a window like we have right now to recover wild salmon and steelhead in the Inland West. The federal agencies have been given until March 27, 2020 to develop a draft EIS (Environmental Impact Statement). They will begin an initial public comment process this fall or winter, with public hearings held around the Northwest, including here in Spokane. Fishing and conservation groups will be joining forces to push the agencies to include dam removal as the preferred alternative in the draft EIS.

SFTU and the Palouse-Clearwater TU Chapter join with anglers, outfitters, conservationists, tribal members and others for a rally on the river in support of removing the four lower Snake River dams September 17th in Clarkston WA at Swallows Park. Drift boats, motor boats, canoes, kayaks and rafts will paddle down to the confluence of the Clearwater and Snake Rivers for a celebration of the Snake River. Kreh Loop

This no-slip loop knot is great for tying on a fly. Different from a tight knot, like a Clinch Knot, it allows for free movement of the fly on the end of the line.

Trout in Hangman Creek?_



We've heard rumors of trout in the Washington section of Hangman Creek, California Creek to be more specific. On Saturday, July 9th a group of citizen scientists from SFTU, Eastern Washington University and Spokane Riverkeeper set out to see if the rumors were true. Using backpack electroshocking equipment, nets and buckets the group split into two teams and searched two sections of lower California Creek.

We found sculpins, redside shiners, dace, pikeminnows, suckers and yes TROUT.

This is the start of a series of studies that we will be undertaking with students from EWU over the next few years. We will be working to understand the abundance and behaviors of trout in the Hangman Creek Watershed and under what conditions Spokane River Redband Trout may be using the tributary.














Elusive Trout
